THE UNIVERSITY

North Carolina State University is a pre-eminent research enterprise that excels in science, technology, engineering, math, design, the humanities and social sciences, textiles and veterinary medicine. With more than 35,000 students and nearly 8,000 faculty and staff, NC State University transforms lives and provides leadership for social, economic, and technological development across North Carolina and around the world.

Many students and faculty from around the globe call Raleigh, North Carolina home. Raleigh, the state's capital city, is consistently ranked as one of the nation's best places to live and work. Approximately 4,800 international students are currently enrolled at NC State, and our international students and faculty represent over 120 countries.

Various campus organizations offer unique travel and other opportunities for students attending NC State. The university is within two hours of the Atlantic Ocean, and within three hours of the Blue Ridge Mountains. The area offers numerous opportunities for hiking, camping, surfing, boating and various other activities.

APPLYING

APPLICATION PROCESS

Students must be nominated by their home school coordinator with the Applicant Nomination Form. Students will then be given access to an online application. Some requirements will be materials submissions (upload hard copy), some will be signature documents (sign digitally) and some will be online questionnaires.

- Proof of English proficiency (if applicable)

- Statement of Understanding: J-1 Visa
- Course Request Form

LEARNING EXPECTATIONS

COURSE LOAD

A minimum of 9 credit hours for graduate students and a minimum of 12 for undergraduate students. One credit is equivalent to fifteen contact hours. More information can be found here: <http://oucc.dasa.ncsu.edu/courseleaf-2/instructional-formats/>

COURSE SELECTION

- Students must fill out a Course Request Form in consultation with an individual at their home university who knows the degree plan. This individual must provide a signature to show that the student can get credit for the courses they are requesting to take.
- Students must choose a major field of study at NC State, and must take at least half of their courses in their major field of study. Their major field of study may differ from their field of study at their home institution.
- Students will be assigned to an academic advisor at NC State in their major field of study. Their advisor will determine eligibility for courses within the department. The Study Abroad Office will register students for courses outside their major field of study and we will consult with the academic departments.
- Students will have an opportunity to meet with the major Academic Advisor during Orientation.

IMPORTANT

- Attendance is expected for all classes, but individual attendance policies are based on the instructors discretion
- Grades usually come from a mix of written examinations, essays, research papers, attendance, & class participation

LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS

All international students must meet the NC State English Proficiency Requirements

Ways to meet English Proficiency Requirements - Effective Starting Fall 2020

- Being a resident/enrolled student of a country where English is the official language of instruction in higher education
- Being currently enrolled in or have successfully completed the equivalent of one semester of instruction in English at a four-year college or university (must provide a letter of support from the home institution)
- Being currently enrolled in a program for which the approval of English proficiency is required upon admission
- Providing a letter from the home institution showing successful completion of a course that is consistent with the approved minimum or CEFR level
- Submitting English proficiency exams scores that meet the minimum requirements in the table below:

HOUSING

GLOBAL VILLAGE

Exchange students are encouraged to apply to live in Global Village (GV) where international students are paired with American roommates. GV is devoted to introducing international students to American culture, exposing American students to other cultures, and making the entire community aware of global issues through exciting academic and cultural programming as well as fun social activities. This popular housing option is very competitive (even among exchange students), so students are advised to apply early and take the application very seriously. OTHER RECOMMENDED LIVING AND LEARNING VILLAGES

- **S.T.A.T.E. Village:** Connects transfers, sophomores, and exchange students for career and academic exploration
- **Arts Village:** Unites students with a passion in the arts. Interact with local artists by attending arts events.
- **EcoVillage:** For students interested in sustainability. Explore interests in environmental conservation, energy, sustainable industry and business, and agriculture.
- **WOW Village:** All women's dormitory focusing on women's leadership. Fall and Spring Break trips offered to Washington D.C. and New York City.
- **Wood Wellness Village:** Supports a healthy, balanced life. Accepts applicants for the Academic Year

OTHER HOUSING NOTES

- The application to live anywhere on campus is competitive. On campus housing is not guaranteed and students are no longer able to preference which residence halls they would like.
- There is an additional application for students to fill out if they choose to apply to live in one of the villages.
- On-campus apartments, such as the Wolf Village and Wolf Ridge, are also available.
- Students who live in on-campus residences other than a learning Village will be charged an early check-in fee.
- If living off-campus, students must find their own housing. The Study Abroad Office can offer general advice.
- Home stays/host families are not available as housing options.

HEALTH INSURANCE AND IMMUNIZATIONS

All international students attending North Carolina State University, including exchange students, will be **required** to maintain a health insurance plan during their time at NC State. Students will be automatically enrolled in the system wide insurance plan administered by Student Blue, Blue Cross Blue Shield of North Carolina. The cost of the insurance plan is **approximately \$1,313.50 per semester**. This cost typically rises each year.

International students have the **option to waive** the Student Blue insurance, as long as they have comparable coverage. However, students who do not waive the insurance, will be automatically enrolled in this plan and will be billed for it through their student account upon arrival.

VISAS

NC State issues documents for exchange students to obtain a J-1 student visa. The benefits associated with J-1 visas include eligibility for internships during and after the first semester. If there is a student that needs an F-1 visa, he/she should notify us during the application process and we will decide if an exception is appropriate, otherwise he/she will be issued a J-1 student visa.
